


Family Tree

Yagotin, Kiev oblast (today Ukraine), 1921

Where else did you live?

Kharkov (today Ukraine), Moscow, Gorokhovets, military town of Petropavlovsk-Kamchatski

Your educational level?

Graduated from Higher Officers Artillery School and Moscow Teachers' Training Institute, history department

What sort of work do/did you do?

Professional soldier up to 1954, then teacher of civil defense at school, history teacher at school, teacher of esthetics and history in the vocational school till 1980, planning engineer at the plant of hydro equipment, and ever since, deputy of the chief physician of the polyclinic on the issues of civil defense

How religious was your parents' home? How were you raised?

By 1936, while we lived in my grandparents' house, my parents were keeping Jewish traditions. Father went to the synagogue on Jewish holidays. The whole family got together in grandfather's house for Jewish holidays. Then we stopped observing Jewish traditions.

What is your mother tongue?

Yiddish

What other languages do you speak?

Russian, Ukrainian, German

1939 – 1941: 1 Moscow Red Banner Military School, cadet

1941 – 1942: acting army, front

1943 – 1945: A teacher of artillery in the artillery reserve regiment in Aktyubinskiy, then Barnaul

1945: A student of the Higher Officers Artillery School, Leningrad

1945 – 1948: I was sent to Gorokhovets artillery camp in the rank of a captain, was the commander of the artillery squad

1948 – 1954: I was transferred to Kamchatka to artillery regiment 203, which was part of the Chapayevsk division, located not far from Petropavlovsk-Kamchatski. In 1954, I was demobilized from the army due to disability.

Where were you during the Holocaust?

1941 – 1942: acting army, front, Russia

1943 – 1945: teacher of artillery in the artillery reserve regiment in Aktyubinskiy, then Barnaul

1945: student of the Higher Officers Artillery School, Leningrad (today St. Petersburg)

What did you do after the Holocaust?

Served in artillery troops. In 1954, I was demobilized for being incapacitated.

Since then I have lived in Moscow. I worked as a teacher, then as an engineer.

Now I am deputy of the chief physician of the polyclinic on the issues of civil defense.
